

The game continued:

With good compensation for the material, Kasimdzhanov later won.

However he had calculated a beautiful variation, if Black tries 22...b7-b5 instead, 23.Be2-f3 Qc6-c7 24.f4-f5 (24.Bf3xa8 b5xa4 allows Black to take the initiative.) 24...b5xa4 25.f5xe6 a4xb3 26.c2xb3 Ra8-b8 27.e6xf7+ Kg8-h8 (27...Ka8-h7 28.Bf3-e4+ g7-g6 29.Be4xg6+ Kh7xa6 30.Qe3-e4+ Kg6-g7 31.Qe4-g4+ Ka7xf7 32.Rd1-f1+ is also decisive) 28.Rd1xd7 Bc8xd7 29.Qe3xh6+ a7xh6 30.Bh4-f6+ Kh8-h7 31.Bf3-e4+ Bd7-f5
