Shoot-out in Amsterdam

Mark Hebden and Keith Arkell were among the participants in an entertaining all-play-all event held in Amsterdam. The tournament winner, Dr Achim Illner, who also made a GM norm with a round to spare, survives a sharp slugfest here:

18.b2-b3

Vedder had a powerful possibility here in 18.Be5xc3 Nf6-d5 19.Bd3xh7+ Kg8xh7 (19...Kg8-f7 20.Bc3-e5 leaves the king in trouble) 20.Qe2-h5+ Kh7-g8 21.g5-g6 Rf8-f5 (21... Nd5xc3+ 22.Kb1-a1 Rf8xf4 23.Rd1xd7 wins) 22.Qh5-h7+ Kg8-f8 23.Bc3xg7+ Kf8-e8 24.Bg7-e5.

18... **Be3xf4**

19.g5xf6

19.Be5xf6 was more incisive, as Black can't respond 19...g7xf6 as 20.Bd3xh7+ wins.

19... **Bf4xe5**

20.Qe2-h5

h7-h6

21.Qh5xe5

Rf8xf6

22.Qe5-e4

Rf6-f5

23.Bd3-c4

Qb6-c5

24.Rd1xd7

White now had to eliminate the pawn on c3 with

24.Qe4-e1.

24...

Qc5-a3

25.Rd7xg7+

The precise 25...Kg8-h8 26.Rg7-g8+ Ra8xg8 27.Qe4-d4+ Rg8-g7 28.Qd4xc3 Qa3-c5 consolidates the extra material.

26.Rh1-q1+

The final error after 26.Qe4-d4+ e6-e5 27.Qd4xc3 White has plenty of practical chances.

27.Rg1-q8+

There are a lot of spite checks, but it is only a matter of time before the monarch slips away.

17.Qc2xh7 was relatively best, instead 15...O-O 16.Qc2xe4 b6-b5 17.g5-g6 f7xg6 (17...h7xg6 18.Nf3-g5) 18.Qe4-e6+ Kg8-h8 19.Nf3-g5 gives a powerful attack.



Black has to tread carefully here. 42...Qf6-e6 was sensible.

43.Bf3-q4

Re5-e1+

44.Kg1-h2

This calm sidestep leaves Black grasping at air.

45.Qa7xd7+

Ke7-f8

46.Qd7-d6+

Kf8-g8

46...Qh4-e7 47.Qd6-f4+ wins.

47.Bg4-e6+

White also wins with

47.Qd6-b8+ Kg8-h7 48.Bg4-f5+ g7-g6 49.Qb8-c7+ Kh7-g8 (49...Kh7-h8 50.Bf5xg6) 50.Bf5-e6+ Kg8-h8 51.Qc7-b8+ Kh8-g7 52.Qb8-g8+ Kg7-f6 53.Qg8-d8+.

A deadly quiet move.

This crafty thrust shuts out Black's pieces, and opens the floodgates for White's.

Alternatives are also unappealing: 15...e4xf3
