Hou Yifan rocks in Gibraltar

Attracting Judit Polgar and Hou Yifan to the usual strong female field was a real coup for the landmark 10th edition of the Tradewise Gibraltar Chess Festival, held as always in the Caleta Hotel. The Chinese star played exceptionally, dispatching a raft of 2700 opposition.

Best was 28.Rg7-a7 Nb4xc2 29.Bh5-f7 d5-d4 30.Bf7xe6 when a draw is on the cards. 28... Nb4xc2 29.Rb7xb5 Kd8-e7 Now Black's king becomes active and, combined with the rook and knight, supports the connected passers in the centre. It is clear all the chances are with Black.
