Gawain Jones and Stephen Gordon, two of the nice auvs of chess, both compiled a hefty 9/11 at the British Championships, with Gawain

winning a scrappy play-off to secure his first title. Stephen could also be proud of his efforts, winning eight

games during the event with

precise positional play.



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White would be in great shape if his bishop was on d4, but without a clear way to improve his position he decides to open the centre.

25.e3-e4

26.Nc3xe4

Be7-f8 27.Ne4-g3 28.Bf4-e3 c4-c3 Stephen correctly judges that, practically, Black's chances are much better once the pawn gets to the seventh rank.
