## Pipped at

 the post by a time lordOne unusual feature of the Grand Slam Masters at Bilbao was that we were given half an hour less to complete the first time control at move 40. This certainly increased the intensity -- the complex time scramble below resulted in a pivotal win for Levon Aronian, who pipped me to the title by $4 / 6$ to $3.5 / 6$.

Aronian could have won without drama by advancing his pawn here: 33...b3-b2 34.Rd6xg6+ f7xg6 35.Qb1xg6+ Kg7h8 36.Qg6-f6+ Bf8-g7 37.Qf6xe7 b2-b1Q+ $38 . \mathrm{Kg} 1-\mathrm{h} 2$ Qa4-d 1 is easy enough.
34.Rd6xg6+
f7xg6
Forced, as 34...Kg7-h8
35.Rg6xh6+ Bf8xh6
36.Rc6xh6+ Kh8-g7
37.Qb1-h7+ Kg7-f8 38.Qh7h8 is mate.

Due to the chronic weakness of the light squares, $36 . . . \mathrm{Bf} 8-\mathrm{g} 7$ fails to 37.Bd5-e4 Bg7-f8 38.Qg6-
f6+ Bf8-g7 39.Qf6-f5 Bg7-f8
40.Rc6-f6.
37.Qg6xh6+ Rg7-h7
38.Qh6-e6

This looks natural to introduce the possibility of Rc6-c8, but White can win beautifully with 38.Qh6g6 Bf8-g7 (38...Rh7-g7 also loses in the long line 39.Qg6-h5+ Rg7-h7 40.Qh5-g4 Qa2-b1+ (40...Bf8-e7 41.Rc6-c8+ Rb8xc8 42.Qg4xc8+ Kh8g7 43.Qc8-g8+ Kg7-h6 44.Bd5-e4) 41.Kg1-g2 Bf8-e7 42.Rc6-g6 Qb $1 \times g 6$ 43.Qg4xg6) 39.Bd5-e4 when Black's rook runs out of squares. 39...Rh7xh3 (or 39...Rh7-h6 40.Qg6-f5 ) 40.Qg6-f5.

## Qa2-b1+

Despite having only a few seconds remaining, Levon calmly inserts the key check to include his queen in the defence, 38 ...Rh7-g7 39.Qe6-h6+ Rg7-h7 40.Qh6g6 wins as above.


## 39.Kg1-g2

The obvious spot for the king, but this is another slip. The game should end in a draw after $39 . \mathrm{Kg} 1-\mathrm{h} 2$ Rh7-g7 40.Rc6-c4 Qb1-h7 (40...Bf8-e7 41.Bd5-e4 is good for White) 41.Rc4h4 Qh7xh4 42.g3xh4 b3-b2 43.Bd5-e4 b2-b1Q 44.Be4xb1 Rb8xb1 45.Qe6h6+ Kh8-g8 46.Qh6-e6+. 39... Rh7-g7 40.Rc6-c8

Now 40.Rc6-c4 Qb1-h7 41.Rc4-h4 Qh7xh4 doesn't help as the ' $g$ ' pawn is pinned.

A better practical chance than 42.Bd5xg8 Qb1-e4+

Although the three pawns aren't sufficient for a rook, the position remains tricky.
44... Qh7-e7
45.f2-f4 Rg5-g7
46.f4-f5

Taking the opportunity to move his pawns forward at the cost of the exchange of queens. 46.Qe3-f3 was the alternative.

### 48.93-g4

This allows Levon to blockade on the dark squares, so 48.Bd5-e6
Bf8-g7 49.h3-h4 Rg5-h5
50.g3-g4 Rh5xh4 51.f5-f6 was a better try.
48... Bf8-g7
49.e5-e6 Bg7-f6
50.Kg2-g3 a6-a5
51.h3-h4 Rg5-g8
52.g4-g5 Kh8-g7

This excellent move makes
the win easy. White's
remaining pawns will be
corralled by the rook and
king.

## 53.Kg3-f4

Play is similar if the bishop is captured immediately: $53.95 x f 6+\mathrm{Kg} 7 \mathrm{xf6}+54 . \mathrm{Kg} 3-$ f4 a5-a4 55.h4-h5 Rg8-h8 56.Kf4-g4 Rh8-d8.
53...

Rg8-h8
54.Kf4-g4 Rh8-b8
55.g5xf6+ Kg7xf6
56.e6-e7 a5-a4

White resigned, as 57.h4-h5 Rb8-e8 58.h5-h6 Re8xe7 59.Bd5-g8 a4-a3 60.h6-h7 Re7xh7 61.Bg8xh7 a3-a2 enables Black to promote.
